Introduction



Over May and June 2021, Council invited the community to help shape the vision for the City of Whittlesea's Green Wedge areas over the next ten years.

More than 60% of the City of Whittlesea is Green Wedge land, defined as rural or non-urban land non-urban land which is located within metropolitan Melbourne that is protected from urban development.

Every Council with Green Wedge areas is required to have a plan to manage these areas. The Green Wedge Management Plan Review will inform the development of a new 2022 – 2032 Green Wedge Management Plan (GWMP), which will replace the current GWMP.

More than 100 people participated in the Stage 1 Community Engagement, giving Council a valuable insight into the community's priorities.

This report shares what the community told us, examining findings as they relate to the Whittlesea 2040's Goals. These results will inform the development of the Draft GWMP which the community will be invited to comment on as part of the Stage 2 Community Engagement in 2022.

At a Glance: Summary of Engagement

Stage 1 of the Community Engagement for this project started on 17 May and closed on 19 July 2021

This summary outlines some of the key themes that emerged through the Stage 1 Engagement and will help inform the Draft GWMP which will inform how the City of Whittlesea's Green Wedge areas are managed over the next ten years.

The conversations we had were centred around the four Whittlesea 2040 goals; Connected Community, Liveable Neighbourhoods, Strong Local Economy, and Sustainable Environment.

There will be further opportunity to comment as part of the Stage 2 Community Engagement on the Draft GWMP 2022 – 2032, before it is finalised.

What did we ask?

Questions we asked during the Engagement included what you value the most about Whittlesea's Green Wedge areas, what themes you want to see included in the vision for the GWMP 2022 – 2036, and what opportunities exist to help achieve this vision.

How we engaged

The Engagement period ran between 17 May to 19 July 2021. Over 100 survey responses were received to our online survey. We held three drop in sessions at locations across the City of Whittlesea, two online information sessions, and one face to face information session.


As Government restrictions were introduced during the Engagement period, we were not able to hold all of the events that had been planned. We adapted to this by extending the Engagement period by a further four weeks, running an additional online information session, and inviting those who had expressed interest in the Engagement to contact us by phone and using the online options available.

Who did we hear from?

Survey responses were received from people across the City of Whittlesea, neighbouring municipalities and other parts of the metropolitan area, including Local Government Areas which also have Green Wedges. 88% of responses came from within the City of Whittlesea, and 12% were from outside the municipality, with approximately half of responses coming from within the Green Wedge.

Of those who did not live within the Green Wedge, the most common connection people had to the Green Wedge was that they visited for recreation or exercise.

The age of respondents was more heavily weighted towards older groups, with people under the age of 35 making up only 17% of respondents, compared with those aged 35-49, who made up 36% of respondents.




What values and themes did you ask to see reflected?

The 'Shape the future of our Green Wedge' online survey commenced by inviting the community to tell us which Green Wedge attributes they valued the most, and which themes they wanted to see included in the final Vision for the GWMP.

What you said you valued the most

Respondents were invited to select their top three Green Wedge attributes or aspects. As indicated in the chart below, most respondents value the wellbeing benefits of green natural spaces and the natural environment that the Green Wedge provides.



Common themes you said you wanted to see covered in the Vision Statement

- Enhance and protect biodiversity
- Protect natural assets / resources
- Encourage and support innovative and sustainable land management practice
- Protect and enhance rural character and landscape
- Protect and promote the rich Aboriginal and post contact heritage within the Green Wedge
- Protect Green Wedge from urban encroachment
- Connect people to natural areas through the provision of walking trails and bicycle paths and other facilities
- Educate and provide support to residents and visitors in caring for and respecting the Green Wedge
- Support farming and food production
- More trees

In Detail: Community Engagement Activities and Findings

Stage 1 of the GWMP Community Engagement period ran between 17 May to 19 July 2021.

The feedback received during the initial Engagement will inform the Draft GWMP 2022 – 2032. There will be further opportunity to comment on the Draft GWMP before it is finalised, as part of the Stage 2 Community Engagement.

Engage Website

Mail out

A mail out pack was sent to 1,545 addresses belonging to residents, land owners and organisations within the Green Wedge, and eight agribusinesses within the City of Whittlesea.

The mail out consisted of a map of the Green Wedge area, a fact sheet, and a letter informing the community of the review with information on how they could participate.

Shaping the future of your Green Wedge – Discussion Paper

As part of the Stage 1 Community Engagement, a discussion paper titled *Shaping the future* of your Green Wedge was released to guide the conversation. The purpose of the discussion paper was to inform the community and other stakeholders about the GWMP Review project and more broadly about the Whittlesea Green Wedge; to generate and collect feedback on the identified opportunities for the sustainable management of Whittlesea's Green Wedge areas, and to inform the development of the vision and priorities for the new GWMP 2022-32.

The community was invited to make written submissions in response to the discussion paper.

Social Media

The community Engagement was promoted on social media platforms of Twitter, Linkedin and Facebook.

Video

A video was produced to promote the review, in which Council Administrator Lydia Wilson and local beef cattle farmer Judy Clements spoke of the importance of Whittlesea's Green Wedge areas. The video can be viewed at the link below.

Plenty Valley FM

Senior Strategic Planner and project manager of the Green Wedge Management Plan Review, Lingna Zhang was interviewed on Plenty Valley FM on 6 July 2021 to inform the community about the project.

Engagement survey

An Engagement survey on the *Shaping the future of your Green Wedge – Discussion Paper* was posted to the project page on Council's Engage website. The survey invited feedback on what the community valued in our Green Wedge areas, what themes they wanted to see covered in the ten year plan, and what opportunities existed.

103 responses were received to the online survey which was a great response from the community, suggesting a strong interest in the Green Wedge. In addition, seven responses were received to a shorter paper version of the survey distributed at our face to face Engagement events.

Let's Talk: Community Engagement 2021 survey

Between February and April 2021 Council undertook the *Let's Talk* community Engagement program as part of a range of activities to inform the Council's four year plan.

Structured around the Whittlesea 2040's four goals, the Council Plan represents Council's commitment over the next four years.

The Green Wedge project team had the opportunity to include two Green Wedge related questions in the 'Let's Talk: Community Engagement 2021' Council Plan survey. The survey asked people what their connection was, and what they valued most about Whittlesea's Green Wedge areas.

By participating in a whole of Council survey, the Green Wedge project was able to reach a broader audience, receiving a total of 81 responses.

Rural News

Rural News is a quarterly newsletter which is distributed to landowners in the Green Wedge area who owns properties greater than 2ha and reaches approximately 900 landholders in total. An information sheet was published in Volume 27 – Autumn 2021 of the newsletter to inform the community about the project.

Online Information session with Q&A

46 people registered for two online information and Q & A sessions. The online events were held between 12 – 1 pm on Tuesday 2 June and Wednesday 15 June 2021.

Face to face Information session with Q&A

A face to information session with Q&A was held on 15 July 2021 at the Whittlesea Community Activity Centre. Eleven people attended the information session.

Drop in sessions

Whittlesea Township (Community Council Forum Event) – 1 March 2021

The first community Engagement event was a GWMP stall held alongside other Council project stalls for the Community Council Forum; an in-person community event held as part of the 'Let's Talk' Community Engagement program. The event was designed to offer an opportunity for the community to meet with Administrators and Council staff to talk about where Council should focus its efforts when preparing the Council Plan.

The project team held a stall alongside others, and provided fact sheets and other information to members of the public about the upcoming Engagement period.

By participating in this whole of Council event, the GWMP team were able to promote the upcoming Engagement period to a greater number of people. We met with approximately 15 people who approached us about the project throughout the afternoon.

Mernda Shopping Centre (Council Plan Event) – 15 March 2021

As with the Council Forum event, the second drop in session, which was held at Mernda Shopping Centre involved pairing up with the Community Engagement team who were holding a drop in session for the 'Let's Talk' Community Engagement. We spoke with approximately 12 people about the project.

Whittlesea Township (Green Wedge Event) – 15 July 2021

The final drop in session was held at Whittlesea Community Activity Centre, following an information and Q&A session. Eleven people attended the Q&A session, while one person met with us during the drop in period that we held afterwards.

Meeting with Agribusiness Community Reference Group

A meeting with five people who run agribusinesses in the Green Wedge took place at Whittlesea Community Activity Centre on 15 July 2021. The meeting was attended by Council's Senior Strategic Planner, Lingna Zhang and Agribusiness Officer Rikki Keys.



What you told us

This section provides a summary of what our community told us. It presents the feedback we received from the *Let's talk* community survey and the *Shape the future of our Green Wedge* survey. It also outlines some of the common themes and opportunities identified for further examination in the Draft GWMP. The conversations we had were centred around the four Whittlesea 2040 goals; Connected Community, Liveable Neighbourhoods, Strong Local Economy, and Sustainable Environment.



Survey response


Overview

103 responses were received to the online survey, with an additional 7 hard copy responses to the survey.

The survey asked the community to tell us what mattered most to them in the Green Wedge, what themes they wanted to see covered in the Green Wedge Management Plan, and invited them to state what opportunities existed for the Green Wedge as it related to the four Whittlesea 2040 goals.


Survey Questions

What is your current connection to the Green Wedge?



Of those who selected 'other' more than half of respondents indicated they were either land owners, prospective land owners, or representatives of land owners, while others said they lived nearby.

What aspects do you value the most about the City of Whittlesea's Green Wedge?




The above chart presents the response to the question: What aspects do you value the most about the City of Whittlesea's Green Wedge? 109 people responded to this question, and were invited to select their top three Green Wedge attributes or aspects.

The wellbeing benefits of green natural spaces, and the natural environment were valued by significantly more respondents compared with food production and associated employment. Of those who selected 'other,' reasons given included cultural or spiritual connection to land, business opportunities, and an overall appreciation of being able to live in an area that is less populated.

How would you like to see the following themes reflected in the vision for our Green Wedge?

Respondents were invited to rank the importance of various themes, from 'Not at all important' through to 'Very important.'



Of all the themes listed, biodiversity/protect significant native plants and animals, and protection of natural resources had the highest percentage of respondents selecting 'very important,' at 72% and 71% respectively, while support a resilient, connected and diverse community attracted the least, at 40%. Local food production / farming / agritourism attracted the highest percentage of people choosing 'not at all important, at 9%.'

Are there any other themes you would like to see reflected in the vision for our Green Wedge?

Many respondents expressed concerns around urban encroachment on the Green Wedge, while others favoured further urban development. A number of respondents spoke of a need to do more about feral animals and invasive species, their impact on habitat and biodiversity, and the need to ensure habitats for wildlife are linked to allow movement from area to area.


Respondents also said they wanted to see a greater focus on Indigenous and farming heritage, and finding ways for the community to connect better to natural areas and open spaces in the Green Wedge.

Connected Community

Rank the following opportunities about creating connected community in our Green Wedge


Respondents were presented with three opportunities, which they were invited to rank in order of importance.



There was a fairly even distribution (30 - 35%) across each opportunity listed in terms of what ranked highest, although 48% ranked engaging community and support community-led initiatives in caring for our Green Wedge 2nd highest. Notably, however, almost half of respondents (49%) ranked connecting urban residents with the Green Wedge through events, recreation, environmental programs, tourism lowest.

Respondents were invited to suggest any further opportunities to achieve connected communities in the Green Wedge. Suggestions received included making efforts to attract visitors to the Green Wedge by providing more trails and bike paths and promoting sites of Indigenous and post contact sites of significance through the provision of heritage markers. However one respondent also warned that too much tourism could work negatively against the goal of creating a connected community. Two respondents also spoke in favour of allowing more urban development, however, the overwhelming sentiment was in favour of preserving the Green Wedge and protecting it from urban encroachment.

Which of the following statements indicate that a connected Green Wedge community has been achieved?




Of those who chose 'other' the majority of comments emphasised the need to prioritise biodiversity, and mitigate the impact of clearing, urban encroachment and weeds. Other comments emphasised the need to make the Green wedge more attractive to visitors.

Liveable Neighbourhoods

Rank the importance of the following opportunities about a liveable neighbourhood in the Green Wedge


Respondents were presented with four opportunities relating to liveable neighbourhoods in the Green Wedge and were invited to rank them in order of importance.



The chart indicates that protecting and enhancing the Green Wedge, and discouraging new development in areas prone to environmental hazards such as flood, erosion and bushfire were considered to be the most important opportunities.

Respondents were also invited to suggest other opportunities for achieving liveable neighbourhoods within the Green Wedge. Suggestions included land management around the rural – urban interface to protect homes from bushfire, flood and erosion, greater flexibility in how people can use their land, investment in amenities within townships, and improved roads and public transport. Overwhelmingly, the sentiment was in favour of protecting the Green Wedge from urban encroachment, and the prioritisation of biodiversity conservation, including through the provision of education in sustainable farming and land management.

Which of the following statements indicate that a liveable neighbourhood in the Green Wedge community has been achieved?



Of those who selected 'other,' suggestions for making the Green Wedge more liveable included better provision of well maintained and accessible amenities and infrastructure for people visiting parks and reserves within the Green Wedge.



Respondents were presented with four opportunities to create a strong local economy in the Green Wedge, and invited to rank them in order of importance.

The chart shows that a higher percentage of respondents thought supporting local business owners in the food industry, and sustainable farm practices were ranked more highly than agri-tourism or supporting the extractive industry.

What are some of the key things Council can do to realise these opportunities?




Which of the following statements indicate that a strong local economy in the Green Wedge community has been achieved?

What are some of the key things Council can do to realise these opportunities?






Do you identify as Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander?










Let's Talk: Community Survey (Council Plan) response

Two questions relating to the Green Wedge were included in the whole of Council 'Let's Talk' Community Survey.

Competing ideas arising from the Engagement process

A range of different and sometimes competing views were shared during the Engagement period. While the overwhelming majority of respondents emphasised the importance of biodiversity, and expressed strong support for protecting the Green Wedge from urban encroachment, there were also community members who put more value on rural living, and expressed that they wanted to see an expansion of opportunities to develop and live within the Green Wedge, and for infrastructure and services to be provided to support this.

The competing views were most prominent in Eden Park, which is affected by the Restructure Overlay. While some landowners expressed the desire for Council to relax restrictions on development, others made it clear they wanted to protect the remnant vegetation and did not wish to see it re-zoned for residential development or farming.

There were also competing views relating to land on the urban/rural interface. While there was agreement by many about the negative impact land speculation was having on these areas, in contributing to neglect and underutilisation of Green Wedge land, some participants believed a solution to this was to allow smaller lots, arguing that small rural living properties would be better managed than larger properties. Others opposed this, on the basis that this would make the land less financially viable for farmers.

It is important to note that any decisions made at the local level as part of the Whittlesea GWMP must be in line with the existing Victorian legislative and policy framework. The State Government's aim is to protect metropolitan Green Wedge land from land uses and development that could diminish its agricultural, environmental, cultural heritage, conservation, landscape, natural resource or recreation values.

There is opportunity for Council to work with the community to build community awareness about the purpose of the Green Wedge, and to manage expectations around how land may be used and developed.

Opportunities identified for achieving our vision for the Green Wedge

The Engagement process was aimed at finding out what the community valued, what themes they wanted to see reflected in the vision for the GWMP, and ultimately to identify opportunities of achieving this vision. The opportunities identified are reflected under the four Whittlesea 2040 Goals; Connected Community, Liveable Neighbourhoods, Strong Local Economy, and Sustainable Environment.

Connected Community

Opportunities identified for creating a connected community included:

- Understand and support the diverse needs of our rural community
- Listen to landowners and residents to benefit from local knowledge
- Greater focus on protection of places of indigenous significance, and incorporation of Indigenous knowledge into how the Green Wedge is managed
- Upskill the community and providing education on important issues relating to the Green Wedge

Liveable Neighbourhoods

Opportunities identified for creating Liveable Neighbourhoods included:

- Protect and enhance the rural landscape
- Discourage new residential development in areas prone to environmental hazards such as flood, erosion and bushfire
- Support good land management on the urban / rural fringe, and discourage the underutilisation and neglect of land that is often associated with land speculation.
- Partner with other Councils, government, and organisations who share a common interest in managing green wedge areas

Strong Local Economy

Opportunities identified for creating a Strong Local Economy included:

- Support local business owners in the food industry for more local jobs and a healthier community
- Offer greater flexibility for producers in how they use their land to carry out diverse, value added, and innovative farming practices
- Increase opportunities for people to buy local produce, e.g. by supporting farmers markets
- Explore opportunities for tourism in the rural areas; from agricultural tourism to recreational activities
- Review Council incentives to better support agribusiness

Sustainable Environment

The City of Whittlesea recently endorsed three strategies to safeguard a sustainable environment. A list of opportunities was already identified in the context of Green Wedge management. The GWMP Engagement has identified the following additional opportunities:

- Partner with field experts to support and provide education in sustainable agriculture and land management practices, soil quality and ecology
- Protect and plant more trees in Green Wedge and grow the significant tree registry
- Work with the State Government to ensure the Urban Growth Boundary stays intact
- Assist landowners, residents and environmental groups to deal with erosion, provide re-vegetation and weed control, and improve the quality of the natural waterways.

- Improve the management and protection of biodiversity
- Support local agriculture and improve water management
- Our residents and our environment benefit from a diverse, colourful and healthy
 City Forest

Next Steps

The feedback received during the initial Engagement with the community and key stakeholders will inform the Green Wedge Management Plan 2022 – 2023. There will be further opportunity to comment before the plan is finalised.
